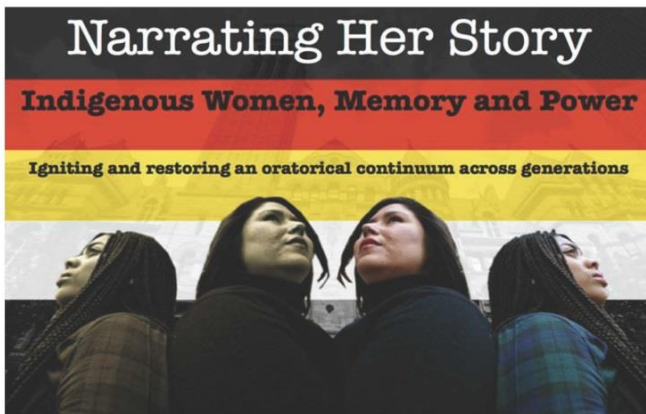
## American Indian Women (ANP 432)
